The question to consider: Is the way I'm using my words eroding trust or building trust?

In a courtroom when a witness is called to the witness stand to give testimony about what they have seen or know about the case in question, the truth is critical to solving the case. The witness is asked to place their hand on a Bible and repeat the following words, "Do you solemnly swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?"

What would happen if lying were the norm in our everyday life? Spouses would not be able to trust one another. Leaders would not be credible. The news would be meaningless. Everything depends on honesty. That's why it's critical to "tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

We can't build relationships if we mistrust what our friends say. We won't follow leaders if we mistrust what they say. We won't make good decisions if we doubt the accuracy of the information we receive.

Without truth, we spend our time second guessing people's intentions, trying to separate the truth from a lie. The end result is that trust is eroded in the relationship. We should be building trust in every relationship not the opposite.

So simply let your 'Yes' be 'Yes', or your 'No' be 'No'. Speak the truth in all things!!!

Verse To Remember: "Change your hearts and lives because the kingdom of heaven is near." Matthew 4:17.

Disclaimer: If you read Day 17 in the book, The Relationship Principles of Jesus, and I hope you did, you'll notice that Matthew 4:17 is listed as the 'Verse To Remember'; however, for today's devotional thought, I am choosing to focus on Matthew 12:34, "Out of the overflow of the heart, the mouth speaks".

This verse is most often taken in the negative sense, i.e. if you have evil in your heart, you will speak evil words, which is most definitely true. It can also be said, if you have love in your heart, you will speak words of love, right? Verse 35 explains, "A good man brings good things out of the good stored up on him...". Then it stands to reason, if you and I want to speak loving words, kind words, encouraging words, words that are "apples of gold on settings of silver" (Proverbs 25:11), we must keep the focus on the heart! The mouth and the heart are directly connected, but no one knows what's in our heart until we open our mouth. The wisest man who ever lived, King Solomon, who gave divinely inspired advice to his sons, said this, "Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it". Wow! What an imperative! The most important thing you can do is **Guard Your Heart.**

We need to pray the words that the church has prayed since Jesus himself spoke those words. We need to regularly return to the words of Jesus. That doesn't mean we simply memorize them and recite them without thinking. We need to actively, intentionally pray these words. We need to return to these words and join with other believers across denominational lines, and across political borders, and across age demographics, and we need to pray. As the global Church of Jesus, the bride of Christ, we need to collectively cry out to God for His will to be done, for forgiveness of our sins, and for deliverance from evil. The best way to improve your prayer life is to pray. So stop reading ... and pray.
